Melvin Disselkoen Biography

I started beekeeping later in life at the age of 29 in the early 70s. I bought 2 swarms and it didn't take long to realize that my interest was in queen production as I love to see new comb being drawn out. I found I could do just as well by dividing my hives into 4 or 5 nucs in the spring and selling all but 1 to be my parent hive to do all over again the next spring. I could make as much money or more selling bees even on the 43rd parallel as I could selling honey. My work was all in the spring and I would have the entire summer off as I produced no honey or had strong enough hive to pollinate.

I designed the MDA SPLITTER in 1979 so beekeepers didn't have to bring their empty boxes and then come back later to pick up the bees. This saves them a trip and all they had to do pick up their bees. I became a EAS Master Beekeeper in the early 80s and was working on developing the IMN SYSTEM OF BEEKEEPING which was the foundation for the OTS (on the spot) non-grafting system of queen rearing. With these discoveries, I could enhance the Miller method of queen rearing and the Doolittle method of starting nucs to what today is a very productive way to produce quality queens. These queens are free and are survivor bees at your own locations. This is designed for the novice and new beekeeper because there is no touching the larva or caging the queen. This method works world-wide. I am willing to help all beekeepers to be the very best they can be.
